Oneness in Communication

Communication isn't just talking. It is being able to share your heart with one another. Without good communication, your marriage doesn't have a chance to succeed. Communication is the way people exchange thoughts and feelings as they try to understand one another and see things from the other's point of view. It is essential in resolving the marital conflicts that inevitably arise. What important principle about good communication is found in James 1:19?
Communication must include listening. The way you listen and respond to another person determines whether you build a fulfilling relationship. You can listen and respond in ways that put distance between you, or you can listen and respond in ways that bring the two of you closer together. Always remember that you earn the right to be heard, but LISTENING is essential.

Oneness in Personal Finances and Possessions

From the time you receive your first wedding gift, you will have to deal with money and material possessions in relation to your marriage. One of the most common contributing factors to divorce in the United States is personal debt. It is one of the greatest detriments to relationships. One of the easiest ways to accrue that debt is through access to credit cards. If you must have a credit card, I advise having one. Use it for emergencies only, as much as is possible.

One family may have opened presents on Christmas Eve while the other family always opened them on Christmas morning. Such differences, while they seem trivial, can cause serious problems in your marriage. Be very careful about thinking your family's way is always right. When you get married, you become an in-law, and you will have inlaws. One of the contributing factors in divorce is often found in strained relationships with that new extended part of your family.

Oneness Means Controlling Your Anger

No couple has the intention of allowing anger to ruin their marriage, but nonetheless many marriages are destroyed by uncontrolled anger. After you get married, there will be times that you get angry. It is important now to determine how you will handle that anger. Anger is like one of the red lights on the dashboard of your car. It is a warning that there is something wrong. In order to control your anger, you must be able to ask yourself, "What is the cause of this anger?"

The secret to mastering anger is to get beyond the emotion and to the root cause. What is it that I am hurt, frustrated, or fearful about? Then decide the best response for a positive outcome. (Remember, you can be RIGHT in your argument, but WRONG because of how you express it)

Controlling your anger is the first step in the process. Resolving anger is the next step in the process. It comes in understanding the cause, choosing an appropriate expression, determining a profitable response/compromise, and forgiving your partner. Ninety-five percent of relationship problems are due to breakdown in communication and unresolved anger.
